Why Spiritual Autobiography

It can be used for several purposes:

- Our own personal reflection
- Discernment of God's call both individually and in community
- Preparing to share our stories with others

Sharing our spiritual autobiographies:

- Is a gift that helps us know that we are not alone in God's world
- Forms communities that support and challenge us
- Builds trust and understanding within a group

74th General Convention (2003)

Resolution A083: Articulate Faith Story

Resolved, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 74th General Convention call every Episcopalian to be able to articulate his or her faith story; and urge dioceses and congregations to create opportunities for these stories to be told.

Writing Your Spiritual Autobiography

Your spiritual autobiography can only be of value if you are honest, talking about what actually happened. Don't write to inspire. Write to learn. In this way, you may uncover the greatest gift of a spiritual autobiography—a stronger faith!

- Your thoughts and feelings are what matter most.
- Never hesitate to write because you feel you cannot spell or do not understand grammar and punctuation.
- The work you do on your spiritual autobiography is for your eyes only. This allows you to be free, without concern about how others will interpret either the context or expression.

Sharing Our Stories

Guidelines

- You decide what you want to share with others
- Speak with “I” statements
- Speak honestly
- Listen actively when others take their turn
- Maintain confidentiality within the group

 - Take another sheet of paper and write about this person based on the cluster
